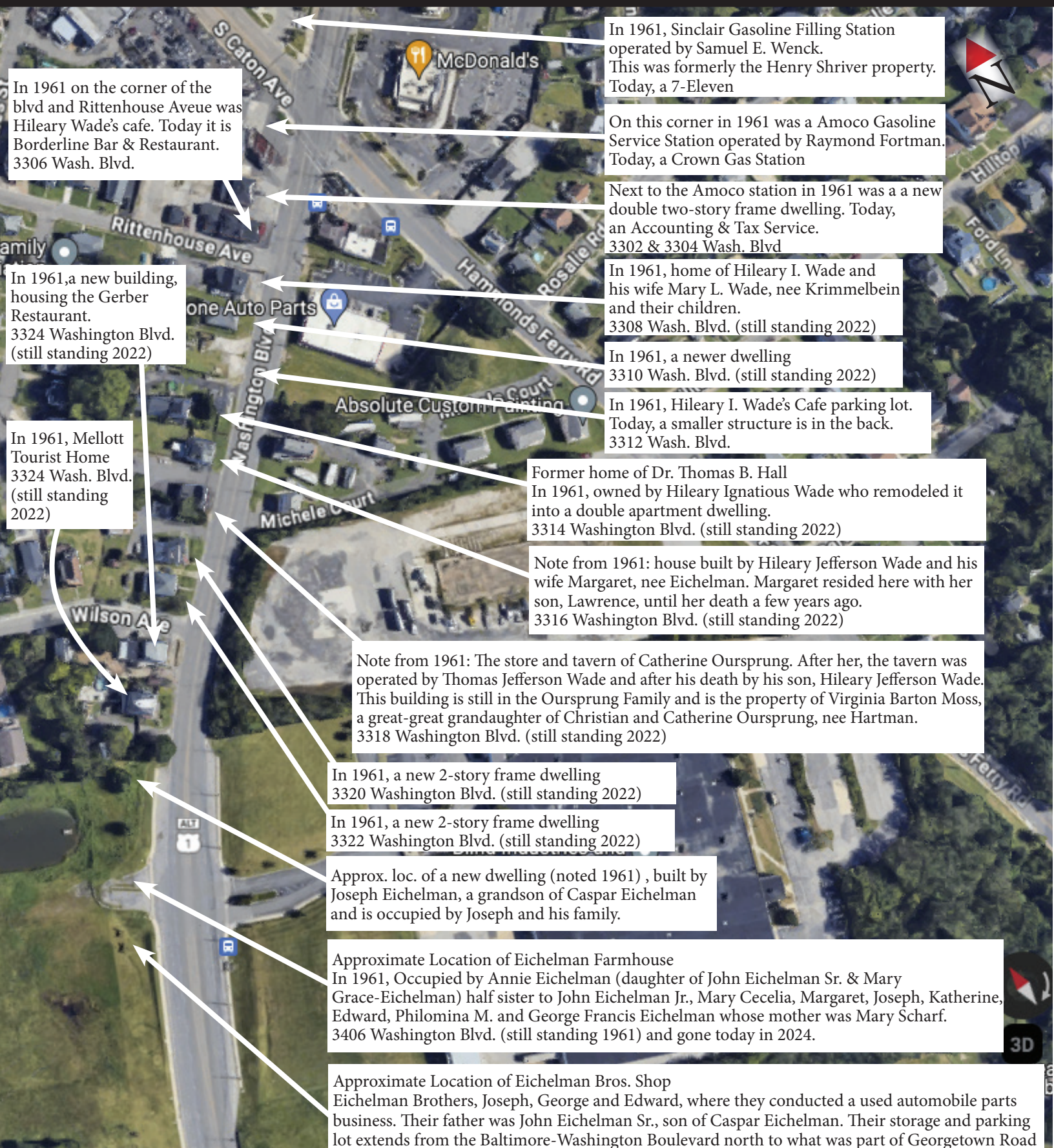


**WEST SIDE OF BOULEVARD** abt 1.17 miles

In 1961 on the corner of the blvd and Rittenhouse Avee was Hileary Wade's cafe. Today it is Borderline Bar & Restaurant. 3306 Wash. Blvd.

In 1961, a new building, housing the Gerber Restaurant. 3324 Washington Blvd. (still standing 2022)

In 1961, Mellott Tourist Home 3324 Wash. Blvd. (still standing 2022)

McDonald's

In 1961, Sinclair Gasoline Filling Station operated by Samuel E. Wenck. This was formerly the Henry Shriver property. Today, a 7-Eleven

On this corner in 1961 was a Amoco Gasoline Service Station operated by Raymond Fortman. Today, a Crown Gas Station

Next to the Amoco station in 1961 was a a new double two-story frame dwelling. Today, an Accounting & Tax Service. 3302 & 3304 Wash. Blvd

In 1961, home of Hileary I. Wade and his wife Mary L. Wade, nee Krimmelbein and their children. 3308 Wash. Blvd. (still standing 2022)

In 1961, a newer dwelling 3310 Wash. Blvd. (still standing 2022)

In 1961, Hileary I. Wade's Cafe parking lot. Today, a smaller structure is in the back. 3312 Wash. Blvd.

Former home of Dr. Thomas B. Hall In 1961, owned by Hileary Ignatious Wade who remodeled it into a double apartment dwelling. 3314 Washington Blvd. (still standing 2022)

Note from 1961: house built by Hileary Jefferson Wade and his wife Margaret, nee Eichelman. Margaret resided here with her son, Lawrence, until her death a few years ago. 3316 Washington Blvd. (still standing 2022)

Note from 1961: The store and tavern of Catherine Oursprung. After her, the tavern was operated by Thomas Jefferson Wade and after his death by his son, Hileary Jefferson Wade. This building is still in the Oursprung Family and is the property of Virginia Barton Moss, a great-great granddaughter of Christian and Catherine Oursprung, nee Hartman. 3318 Washington Blvd. (still standing 2022)

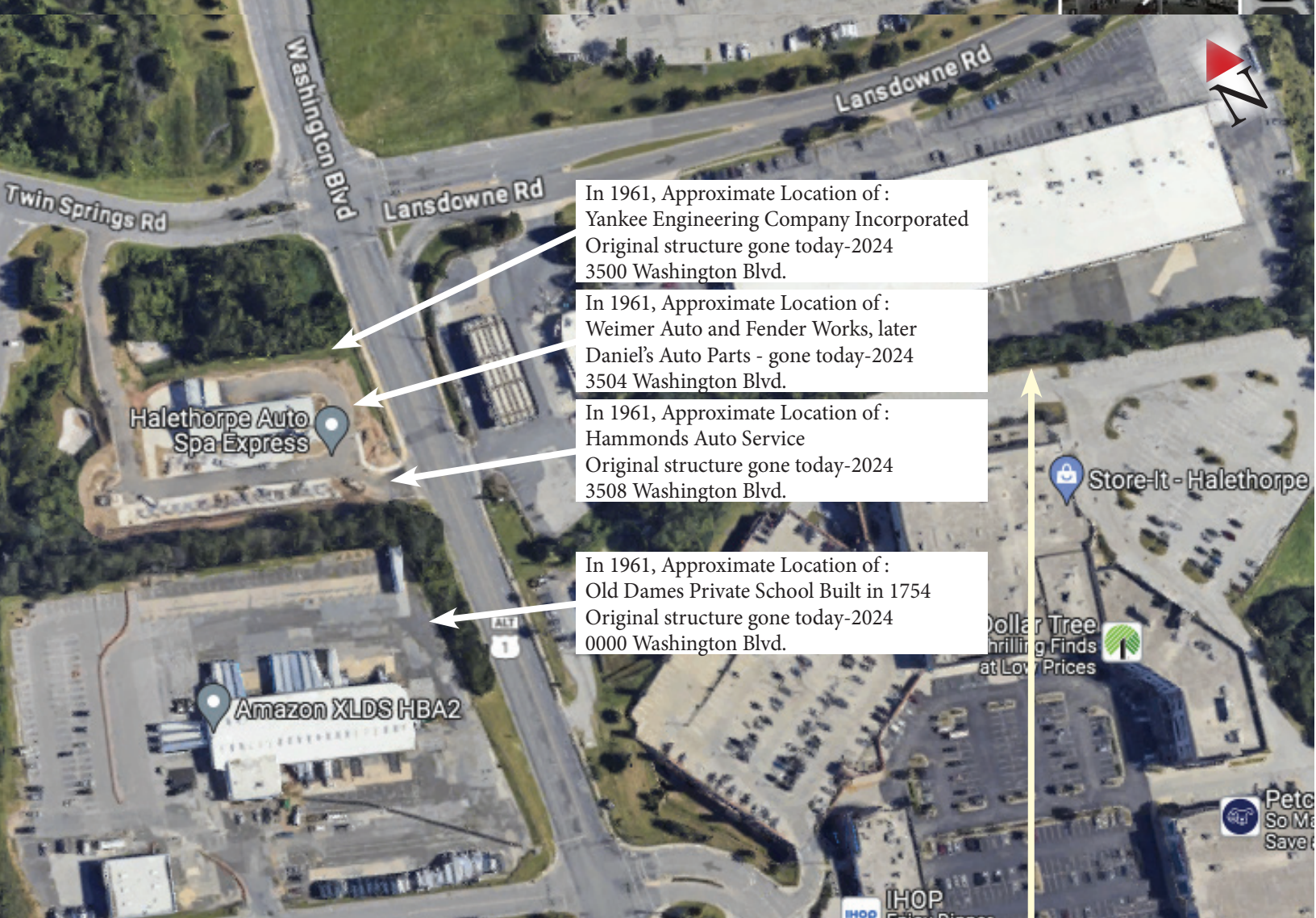
In 1961, a new 2-story frame dwelling 3320 Washington Blvd. (still standing 2022)

Approx. loc. of a new dwelling (noted 1961) , built by Joseph Eichelman, a grandson of Caspar Eichelman and is occupied by Joseph and his family.

Approximate Location of Eichelman Farmhouse In 1961, Occupied by Annie Eichelman (daughter of John Eichelman Sr. & Mary Grace-Eichelman) half sister to John Eichelman Jr., Mary Cecelia, Margaret, Joseph, Katherine, Edward, Philomina M. and George Francis Eichelman whose mother was Mary Scharf. 3406 Washington Blvd. (still standing 1961) and gone today in 2024.

Approximate Location of Eichelman Bros. Shop Eichelman Brothers, Joseph, George and Edward, where they conducted a used automobile parts business. Their father was John Eichelman Sr., son of Caspar Eichelman. Their storage and parking lot extends from the Baltimore-Washington Boulevard north to what was part of Georgetown Road and west to the east property line of the former Tieman's farm as noted in a previous map.



In 1961, Approximate Location of : Yankee Engineering Company Incorporated Original structure gone today-2024 3500 Washington Blvd.

In 1961, Approximate Location of : Weimer Auto and Fender Works, later Daniel's Auto Parts - gone today-2024 3504 Washington Blvd.

In 1961, Approximate Location of : Hammonds Auto Service Original structure gone today-2024 3508 Washington Blvd.

In 1961, Approximate Location of : Old Dames Private School Built in 1754 Original structure gone today-2024 0000 Washington Blvd.

This area is now named Lansdowne Station with a Walmart anchor store. It was previously the Coursey Farm and the farms of Michael Reitz, Fred Link and Kalines The farms ran from this point on the blvd. east to the B&O Railroad ----->

In 1961, a new residence built by Henry Wagener, now occupied by his daughter May and her husband, Harry Helwig and family. To the rear of this dwelling they conduct The Helwig Mower Shop Garden and Lawn Supplies. Gone in 2022, new structure/business today-2024 3604 Washington Blvd.



In 1961, another two-story frame house constructed by the Eichelman Brothers 0000 Washington Blvd. Gone in 2024

Approximate Location of Original Coursey Family Cemetery

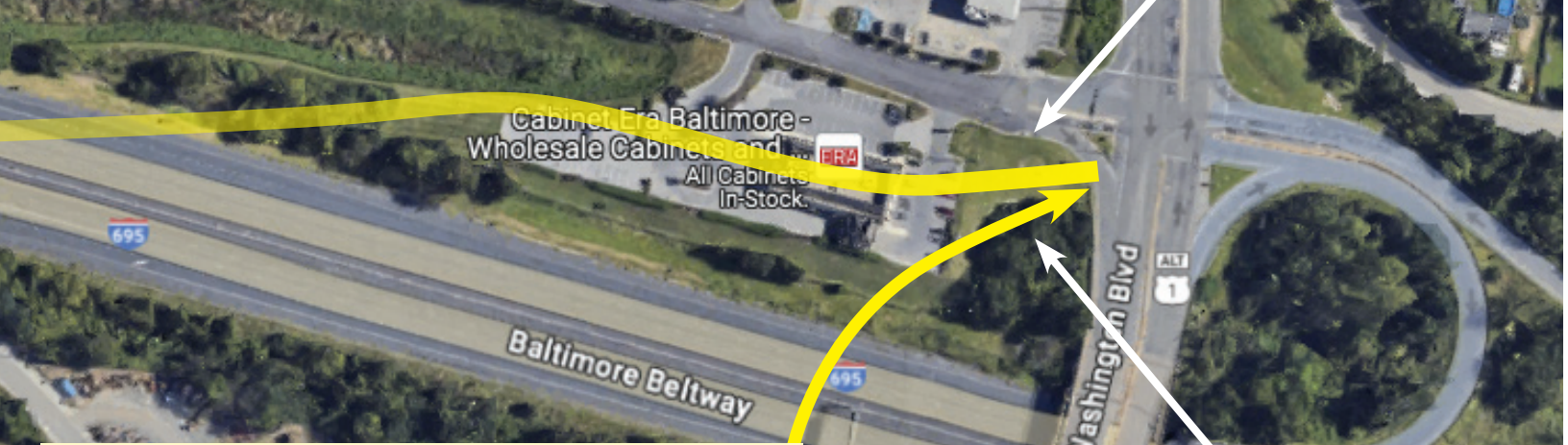

In 1961, a dwelling 0000 Washington Blvd. Still standing-2024

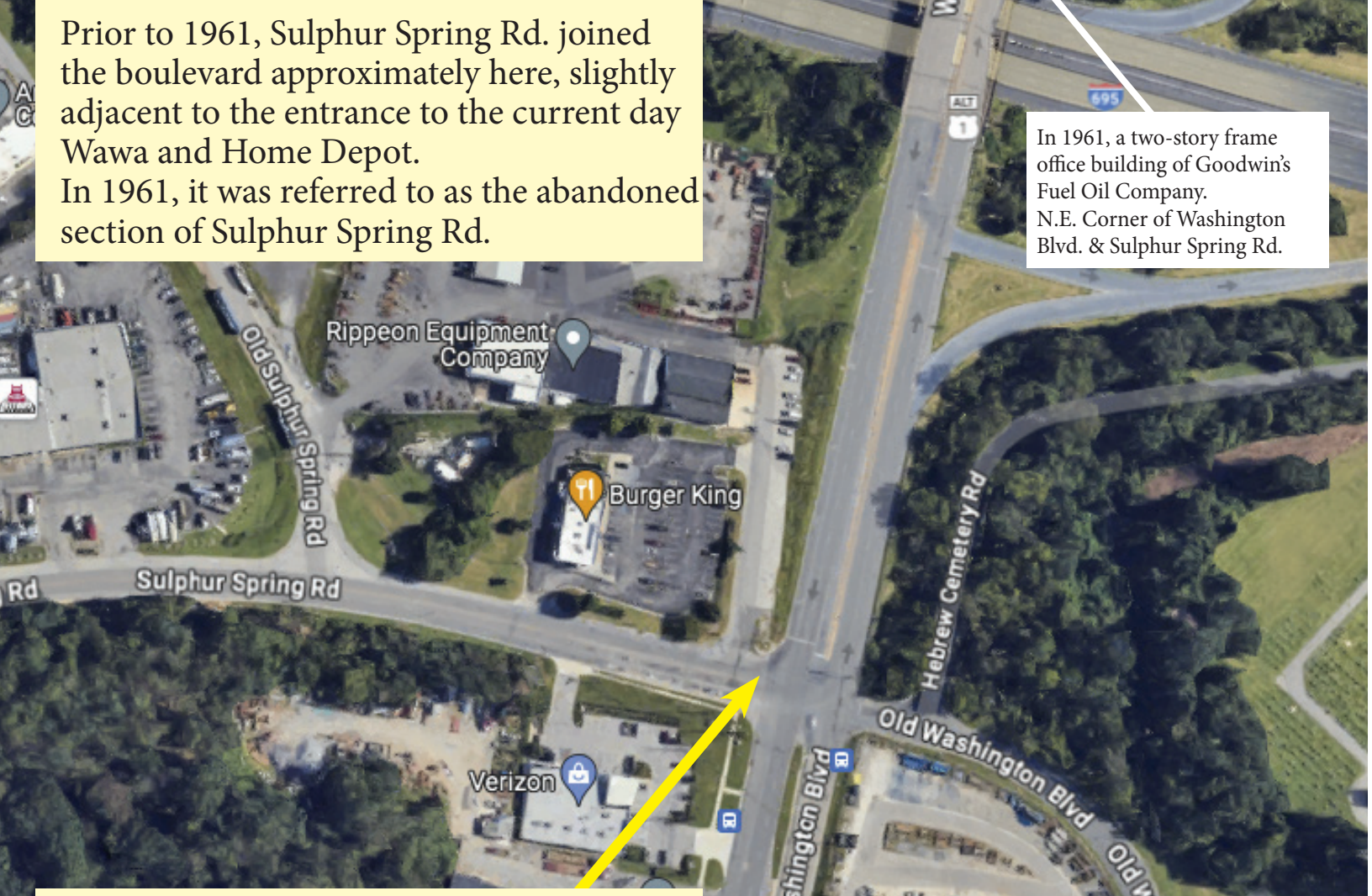
In 1961, a dwelling occupied by R.D. Keys Today-2024, this is a newer structure, aWawa Gas & Convenience Store 3716 Washington Blvd.

In 1961, the tavern of George H. Shaw N.W. Corner of Washington Blvd. & Sulphur Spring Rd.



Prior to 1961, Sulphur Spring Rd. joined the boulevard approximately here, slightly adjacent to the entrance to the current day Wawa and Home Depot. In 1961, it was referred to as the abandoned section of Sulphur Spring Rd.

In 1961, a two-story frame office building of Goodwin's Fuel Oil Company. N.E. Corner of Washington Blvd. & Sulphur Spring Rd.



In 1961, this is the relocated Sulphur Spring Rd. joining the boulevard after the first section of the Baltimore Beltway opened (running from Rt. 40, Baltimore National Pike to Rt. 2, Governor Ritchie Highway).
